⁵ When he would have put him to death, he feared the multitude, because they counted him as a prophet. ¹	²⁰ for Herod feared John, knowing that he was a righteous and holy man, and kept him safe. When he heard him, he did many things, and he heard him gladly.	
⁶ But when Herod's birthday came, the daughter of Herodias danced among them and pleased Herod.	²¹ Then a convenient day came, that Herod on his birthday made a supper for his nobles, the high of- ficers, and the chief men of Galilee. ²² When the daughter of Herodias herself came in and danced, she pleased Herod and those sitting with him. ¹ Matthew 14:5 and Mark 6:20 do not contradict each other by one saying Herod feared the crowd (Matthew) and the other that he was fascinated by John (Mark). These two things could easily be true at the same time. Herod wanted to keep the strange, wilderness prophet around for his own curiosity, but he also knew it could cause trouble among the people if he gave into his wife's demands.
