<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> When John 6:16 says the disciples left in the evening, it does not disagree with Matthew 14:22 and Mark 6:45, which say the disciples left immediately. First, the evening was imminent when Jesus fed 5,000+ people just before this. Second, the Gospels frequently use the word εὐθέως (eutheos), often translated as immediately. This expresses that something happened quickly, anywhere from immediately to soon. The point is that Jesus did not delay. He saw the crowd plotting to put Him in power and wasted no time leaving—although it was already late.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> Mark 6:45 says they set out for Bethsaida, while John 6:17 says Capernaum. Furthermore, John 6:21 says they arrived "where they were going," while Mark 6:53 says they landed at Gennessaret. However, they were *coming* from Bethsaida as well. There were two villages called Bethsaida: one on the northwest side of the Sea of Galilee, and another, sometimes called Bethsaida Julius on the northwest side. The disciples were apparently sailing from the wilderness near Bethsaida Julius to the region around the northwestern Bethsaida. This village lay in the same region as the larger settlements of Capernaum and Gennesseret, and these names were likely used interchangeably to describe the area where they were located.

<sup>4</sup> Jesus did not plan to abandon them but to demonstrate His power and reveal His true nature. Compare this with God's revelation of His glory to Moses when He passed by (Exodus 33:20-23).

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>5</sup> John 6:14 shows the crowd acknowledging Jesus as Messiah after He miraculously fed 5,000+ people. Yet, in Mark 6:51-52, the disciples still lacked understanding of who Jesus is. In John, the crowd recognize Jesus as Messiah but misinterpret that as a powerful military and political leader. Mark speaks specifically about the disciples. Even if the disciples joined the crowds in assuming Jesus was the Messiah, they shared the crowd's misunderstanding of that role. However, that was far from understanding Him as the Son of God (Matthew 14:22; Mark 6:51.
